Pastor's Letter

Friends,

Easter... bunnies and chocolate eggs, jelly beans, egg rolls and egg hunts; did you ever wonder where it all started? Or even the origin of the word "Easter"?

No one can say for sure but there are some theories around the etymology of the word Easter. For some it is the celebration of spring for others a day to remember deliverance and for many the celebration of new life in Christ. Some of the theories put forward for the origin of the word Easter_I've discovered are as follows: It comes from the name of the pagan Anglo-Saxon goddess "Eostre." She was said to have been the goddess of the sunrise and spring. The direction of the sunrise, east, is named after her.

While the pagans celebrated rites of spring, the Jews celebrated Passover, the celebration of the Hebrew slaves being delivered out of Egyptian bondage. The Hebrew word is *Pesach*. If you recall the story YHWH demanded the firstborn male form every household but promised to pass over any house with the blood of a sacrificial lamb smeared on the doorpost. The dating of this celebration in the Jewish calendar corresponds with the beginning of spring.

Another theory is the word Easter comes from the Frankish church (Germanic people who settled in Rome during the 5th century). Their



celebration of the resurrection of Christ was called *alba* which means white, the color of the robes worn during the celebration. Later when the name of the festival was translated in the word *ostern*, meaning sunrise, was chosen perhaps in error. And that *ostern* is the origin of the word Easter.

From very early on the followers of Jesus of Nazareth began to understand Jesus crucifixion as carrying a deeper meaning of Passover. As Jesus was crucified during the time of Passover his death came to be seen as the ultimate sacrifice and he as the ultimate once and for all sacrificial lamb. And around this, over the centuries, the church has developed different views of "atonement" or just what and how Jesus' death accomplished God's love desire for the salvation of the world (see John 3:16.)



Easter . . . is it bunnies and chocolate, colored eggs and baskets lined with plastic grass, new spring dresses and outfits, hot cross buns and ham,

(or lamb pie if you're Sicilian!) These are all good fun, especially for the

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kids and youthful among us!

But for many Christians Easter is more significant than Christmas. It's Resurrection Day! The day the church celebrates Jesus' triumphal over the grave claiming victory over death.



What is the resurrection? On one knows how it happened. No one was there to witness it. The witnesses only report an empty grave and powerful experiences of meeting the risen Christ. I believe this is how God intended it for in this way resur-

rection is not limited to a replication of what took place nearly two millennia ago. But resurrection can

take place anytime some one finds new life, a second or third opportunity at life. Isn't this also a deeper meaning behind spring? As the song in our hymnal goes,



In the bulb there is a flower; in the seed, an apple tree;

In cocoons, a hidden promise: butterflies will soon be free!

In the cold and snow of winter there's a spring that waits to be,

Unrevealed until its season, something God alone can see.

Submitted by Bob Bengtson Susan Ferré has spent the last ten years directing a non-profit organization, Music in the Great North Woods, which sponsors, free of charge, classical concerts and organ scholarships in New Hampshire's North Country. She serves St. Barnabas Episcopal Church in Berlin, NH, as Organist and Director of Music, and has recently been elected Dean of the NH Chapter of the American Guild of Organists.

She has performed widely in Europe, Scandinavia, Brazil, Canada, and throughout the United States. She has served the faculties of Pacific Lutheran University in Tacoma, WA, Southern Methodist University, Perkins School of Theology, University of North Texas and the University of Paris at Vincennes. For more than twenty years Ferré directed the Texas Baroque Ensemble, an original instrument ensemble with 16 singers.

She holds degrees from Texas Christian University, the Eastman School of Music, University of North Texas, and was a Fulbright Scholar to Paris, where she received the Diplome d'Orgue et Improvisation from the Schola Cantorum in 1969. She has received honors for her contributions to early music from the University of North Texas and recently from Perkins School of Theology in Dallas. Her numerous recordings have received glowing critical reviews as well as a Gold GrIndie Award for creativity and accessibility. This concert is free to the public.


