Dear friends,

The Lunar (or Chinese) New year is celebrated on February 1 this year. As I understand it, we are entering the year of the tiger! I know there are some that celebrate this day with a gathering for family and friends and Asian foods.

The Celts celebrated Imbolc on February 1. Imbolc also known as also called Saint Brigid's Day marks the beginning of Spring and honors the saint who was known as the protector of homes and livestock. This celebration predates the Christian observance, and was thought to have had elements of weather divination, and the ancient tradition of watching to see if serpents or badgers came from their winter dens may very well be a forerunner of our North American Groundhog Day.

Which leads us to February 2 as we know it, Ground Hog's Day. And whether we really hold to the tradition or not, some of us still will want to know whether old "Punxsutawney Phil" saw his shadow or not. And whether he did or didn't we will then turn back to the more recent tradition of watching Bill Murray in Ground Hog's Day over and over and over... Did you know that Ground Hog's Day is also known as Candlemas and has its roots in an ancient Christian feast day marking the Presentation of Christ in the temple (Luke 2:22–38)? Records of this celebration have been found as early as the fourth century. It was observed with many lighted candles and thus was know as a "candle – mass".

Welcome the Barrows Granville and Lorraine

Granville (Gran) and Lorraine Barrows met in the music department of UNH and have been making music together or singly ever since. Lorraine has taught instrumental and vocal music in Maine, Massachusetts, Rhode Island and most recently, in Rochester, NH. Their several moves have allowed them to play in many bands, community orchestras, brass quintets, theater pit bands and even a week-long stint for the Ringling Brothers, Barnum and Bailey Circus. Both heavily involved in the barbershop vocal music world, Lorraine

Prior to that he worked in sales--mostly furniture--and owned the Scandinavia House furniture stores in Maine. Gran grew up in Waterville, ME and Lorraine in New London, NH. They have two children, Peter, and Robyn, and three granddaughters. All love the water and are excited that their parents and grandparents now live on the river and have close access to all the lakes here. Welcome the Dupaks Peter and Dawn

Dawn was raised in Vancouver, Canada. After graduating from the University of British Columbia, (B.A Fine Arts 1973) she moved to Toronto and worked for 8 years as an Interior Designer for a major department store. Peter is a native of Toronto, Canada (University of Toronto, BASc, Civil Engineering 1969, M.Eng., Mining Engineering, McGill University, 1971) and began his professional career with International Nickel Co. of Canada at their mines in northern Ontario.

Along the way Dawn and Peter met in Montreal in 1970 and were married in 1974, which dovetailed nicely with Peter's transfer to INCO's head office in Toronto to work on the development of INCO's international assets in Mexico, Guatemala, Brazil, South Africa, Indonesia, and New Caledonia. During this time they started a life-long love of travel, discovering the deep enjoyment of experiencing diverse cultures.

Their first daughter, Erin, arrived in 1981. In 1982 they moved to Chatham, NJ when Peter joined Morgan Guaranty Trust as their VP/Mining Engineer. Kim, daughter #2, arrived in 1984.

As well as being Team Mom Extraordinaire, Dawn was a "professional" volunteer while the girls were growing up and served on the boards of The Arts Council of the Morris Area (now Morris Arts), The Friends of Florham, The Marionette Players, The Municipal Alliance Committee of the Chathams, The Youth Interfaith Council of the Chathams, Chatham High School PTO, Chatham Middle School PTO, Washington Avenue School PTO, Stanley Congregational Church, and the Junior League of Morristown. She also ran her own business as an independent contractor for a major women's ready to wear direct marketing firm for 26 years.

While Dawn kept the home fires burning during the week, Peter trotted the globe. In his 40 years (and still counting) with Morgan Guananty Trust, JP Morgan, Chase and JPMorgan/Chase he has visited over 165 countries and accumulated over 9 million air miles, but rarely missed a weekend game or meet in which the girls were involved. In 2009 the Dupaks purchased a vacation home on Lake Winnisquam to be near Erin (BSc Bio-Medical Engineering, WPI, 2004, M.Eng., Bio-Engineering, UCSD 2005) and her husband Tom Daly. military service in 2014. Laconia became Dawn and Peter's permanent residence in 2019. Having the whole family in one state is a blessing for which they are very grateful.

Together, their other interests include downhill skiing, sailing, bridge, gourmet cooking, gardening and travel. Their newest volunteer experience is with Winnisquam Watershed Network. Dawn also enjoys a variety of needle arts including quilting with The Belknap Quilters Guild and Peter is a skilled stained glass craftsman. But **most importantly**, they enjoy their 4 grandchildren.

They feel blessed to be living in NH and are very grateful for the warm welcome they have received from their neighbors, the WWN, the BMQG, and Laconia UCC.
