# THE CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH OF LACONIA, UCC MINUTES OF THE 198th ANNUAL MEETING SUNDAY, JANUARY 29, 2023 Church Sanctuary and Zoom

Moderator Don Clarke called the meeting to order. Don Clarke affirmed that a quorum was present. According to the bylaws a quorum is 5% of membership @256 members a quorum is 13 or more members. He noted that there was one person attending the meeting on zoom.

Rev. Campbell Lovett opened the meeting with a prayer.

The Call to the meeting was read by Jean Clarke, Acting Recording Clerk.

**Approve Minutes of the 197th Annual Meeting - January 30, 2022**: Don opened the floor for questions/concerns with last year's Annual Meeting Minutes. Pat Wood motioned to approve the 197th Annual Meeting Minutes as presented and Tammy Emond seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously.

**Membership Anniversaries:** Don highlighted the membership anniversaries from the Annual Report. We recognized people who have been members for over 40, 50, 60, 70 and 80 plus years. Caring Connections members recognized the 13 members we lost to death this year. The current membership count is 256.

**Deacon Emeritus Award Presentation:** Margie Kreitler presented this year's Deacon Emeritus Award to Don Clarke. Margie read "the way Don lives out his life each day embodies the attributes of a true Deacon. Don's 'what can I do for you?' has touched many lives in the church and community."

**Church Service Award Presentation:** Don welcomed Wayne Domin, Vice Moderator, to present this year's CSA. Wayne presented this year's CSA to Hollis and Greg Thompson and highlighted their behind-the-scenes commitment to a wide range of church programs and activities. From the display of flags on Memorial Day to the Pumpkin Fest and Thanksgiving Dinner, Hollis and Greg have played an integral part in the life of our church. Hollis and Greg received a standing ovation.

**Annual Reports/Year in Review:** Don reviewed some highlights from the Annual Reports of various committees and staff members. Jean Clarke made a motion to accept the committee reports as printed in the Annual Report. Wayne Domin seconded. John Intorcio noted that there were 11 members removed from membership by death and 3 additions by new members and letter of transfer. Motion passed unanimously.

2023 and the report for 2022. Hollis provided several highlights from the 2022 report. There were no questions from the members present. Hollis provided several highlights from the 2023 proposed budget including: some committee budgets were reduced, a 5% pay raise for all staff, and facility/office and other expense increases. Pat Wood made a motion to accept the proposed 2023 budget as presented. Lorraine Barrows seconded the motion. There were several questions that were addressed by Hollis. John Walker made an amended motion that the congregation take up to 4.5% of a 4-year average from the consolidated fund as needed to balance the budget. The amended motion was seconded by Mark Townsend. There was much discussion regarding the pros and cons to this amendment. John Walker withdrew his amended motion and Mark Townsend withdrew his second. There was some discussion on the original motion to accept the proposed 2023 budget. Motion passed unanimously.

**Nominating Committee Report:** Wayne noted that the Nominating Committee Report was included in the Annual Report. There is an opening for a Recording Clerk, two openings on Property and Finance, one

opening on Diaconate (Don Clarke volunteered to serve), one opening on Educational Ministries for a high school student, one opening on Outreach, and all other committees are filled. Luann Mussari noted a correction to the report for Music and Worship Committee: Kathy Giovanni 24 (1) is in her second year of her first term on Music and Worship. Wayne made a motion to accept the Nominating Committee Report as presented with one correction noted above. Hollis Thompson seconded. Motion passed unanimously.

**Election of Officers/Committee Members/Installation:** Rev. Lovett led us in a Service of Affirmation of Lay Ministry.

#### **Other Business:**

Luann Mussari noted that there is a Safety and Security ad hoc committee to address the need to protect church property and ensure the safety of the people of our church community, friends and neighbors. There will be two meetings after the church worship service in February to hear the thoughts and ideas of church members on this topic.

A Bylaws ad hoc committee led by Sue Smith is being formed to review and revise the church's bylaws. A copy of the current bylaws can be sent electronically or is available in printed format in the church office. Please check with Sue if you would like more information on this exciting and long-awaited endeavor.

Jaylene Bengtson, Search Committee member, reported that the Search Committee has met several times in the last few weeks. They have been getting to know each other and are enthusiastic about taking the next steps on this spiritual journey. Currently, they are reviewing the 2017 church profile developed by the prior Search Committee. The church profile is one tool of many that provides potential candidates for the Pastor position with an in depth look at our church. From there, they will create a new profile and will be gathering input from the congregation so that everyone can be involved in developing this document. Your voice will be heard! Your opinion matters! and reach out to any member of the Search Committee if you have questions or ideas.

**Closing:** Don formally handed off the Moderator's gavel to Wayne Domin. Wayne thanked Don for his faithful leadership and "respectful, conscientious and sacrificial service." Wayne stated that he was looking forward to 2023 and working together in service to God and the church.

Benediction: Rev. Lovett led us in a benediction.

#### Minutes of Special Meeting Sunday, April 16, 2023 Re: Proposed Amendments to the Church's Bylaws

Moderator Wayne Domin opened the meeting immediately following the worship service (10:32) in the church sanctuary, for the purpose and presentation of, and action upon, the proposed Amendments to the Church's Bylaws.

It was determined that a quorum was present. (Only 13 members currently needed to fulfill that.)

Interim Pastor, Campbell Lovett, opened the meeting with a prayer.

Wayne announced that we would be following Roberts Rules of Order; John Kreitler would serve as Parliamentarian. Wayne gave a brief overview of the process of getting to this meeting which began in 2019. Leadership changed, copies of the Bylaws were in flux, COVID came, Zoom meetings, etc. The Ad hoc Committee of Sue Smith, Ted Tunnicliffe, Sandy Brallier, and Ashley Coddington reconvened and met with John Walker, Wayne Domin, and Pastor Campbell Lovett to refine the Bylaws to better reflect the current demographics of this congregation and have current, understandable, practical Bylaws that represent and align with our Mission. This meeting was also available via Zoom, with thanks to Mike Marshall and Rich Morgan.

The motion to "approve the 2023 by-laws as amended and presented" was made by John Walker, seconded by Alida Millham. Paper copies of the current bylaws with differences highlighted in red were available to all. Sue Smith gave a brief overview and explanation of the changes within each page. Article III, "Membership" was questioned how members changed from active to 'inactive status'. Ultimately it is only the person themselves who decides inactive status. Another question within Membership determined there are now 20-30 "associate members." Aside from those points, the rest of the changes went without discussion. Mark Townsend called the vote; it passed unanimously. Rev. Lovett reflected that the bylaws is a living document, a guideline that may be ever-changing. He ended the meeting with a prayer. Wayne closed the meeting with a gavel at 10:50.

All Members and Associate Members shall be entitled to vote in person or by electronic means."

It was noted that the quorum was met with at least 10% of the membership in attendance and via Zoom. Kathy Giovanni, Chair of the Search Committee, offered the opening prayer.

Wayne reported that Roberts Rules of Order would be followed for the duration of the meeting and John Kreitler was serving as Parliamentarian. He then recognized and thanked the members of the Search Committee for their diligence, efficiency and energy. Kathy reiterated a thank you to all spouses of those members for the time they had given.

The meeting was called to order at 10:53. Kathy Giovanni moved the motion that "we accept Reverend Eliza Tweedy as the next settled pastor and teacher of the Congregational Church of Laconia, UCC." Diane Tinkham seconded the motion.

Wayne opened the meeting for comments and questions. Most questions centered around the logisitics of housing, travel, hours in the office, which were answered by members of the Search Committee. Wayne stated her start date would be March 1, and Rev. Lovett would be working on a 'bridge' transition.

Wayne re-stated the motion and asked for the vote verbally by "yes" or "no" at 11:05. The motion passed unanimously in house and online.

The meeting adjourned at 11:08. Eliza and her family returned to the sanctuary with a standing ovation.

#### 2023 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE INTERIM PASTOR

Love God, Love Neighbor, Include Everyone

In this report, I'd like to share about my time at Congregational Church of Laconia as *Interim*, *Pastor*, and *Community Member* – with many sincere thanks.

There are a variety of ways to understand the role of interim pastor. In some ways, I have worked in a few of those roles as *placeholder*, *bridge*, and *transitional pastor*.

- ➤ I have been a "placeholder" in the pastoral office while the Search Committee did its work of seeking and calling. It has been a good fourteen months of being the pastoral cog in the mission and ministry operation of the church.
- Some call this a "bridge" time that connects one settled pastor to the next. Thus, I have bridged the time between Rev. Neil Wilson's retirement and Rev. Eliza Tweedy's arrival. From a wider perspective, I was also with you during a time when our world bridged from pandemic to endemic. Together, we have been a part of significant moments in the history of this church and nation.
- ➤ Others define the interim role as "transitional pastor." In that role I have helped the church work through five phases of interim ministry from grieving the departure of Rev. Wilson to helping generate excitement about the arrival of Rev. Tweedy and all the many good efforts in between. Thank you for allowing me to be your interim.

I have also served in the role of Pastor in a mutual ministry in your midst. You have entrusted me with the pastoral care of this church, and I have been honored to serve in this way. We have experienced (and experimented) with a variety of worship styles; we have shared a few seasonal programs that have enriched our spirits; and I have engaged with many of you in times of illness, infirmity, and grief. Thank you for trusting me to be your pastor.

One of the joys of a leadership position at Congregational Church of Laconia is the instant respect garnered by members of the community – far beyond anything I deserved. I engaged with civic leaders regarding challenges to the Laconia community by those who undermine the common good by acts of racism, bigotry, and hate. Laconia civic and religious leaders have responded with unity, courage, and strength. I found many good colleagues among ecumenical and interfaith partners in the Lakes Region and our clergy meetings were important for building a spirit of cooperation. And, as some of you know, I was a big supporter of Laconia commercial enterprises that served coffee, made sandwiches (or burritos), fixed bicycles, sold books, framed prints, served lunch, cut hair (infrequently), and offered personal training. Thank you for encouraging me to be a member of the wider community.

Surely, I could expand each of these paragraphs with pages of examples. However, allow me simply to add some of my takeaways about this church:

- You are a lay-led church of very committed people. I have been impressed with the way that lay leaders open and close meetings in prayer; participate fully in programs and worship and step up to serve on committees. This is an impressive feature of the church and will keep you in good stead in the future.
- You are hard workers! Fairs, Scarves in the Square, special music, bazaars, auctions, meal prep and serving, food pantry stocking, serving with the Association and Conference, watering flower buckets, leading Bible studies, visiting members and friends, writing devotionals, praying for the community. I truly believe that a strong work ethic is in the spiritual DNA of this congregation.

- You are willing to have fun and share your good humor. I have had many, many fun moments in your midst. We have worked hard together, but we have also had a great time together! I forgot how difficult full-time parish ministry was (after 10 years away in Conference Ministry), but your openness to change, your sense of humor, your grace, and your affirmation have made all the hard work and busy schedule wonderful. Thank you for being a vibrant, fun-loving, and spiritually deep congregation.
- You have a great blend of lay leaders and church staff. I have enjoyed working with such dedicated leaders. I have enjoyed being on the staff team with Bob, Carolyn, Chuck, Karen, and Mike as well as a number of office volunteers who assist in busy seasons. I have also appreciated the opportunities to serve with the officers of the church in visioning and planning. You are in good hands!

I do think that your best days are yet to come, Congregational Church of Laconia! Thank you for inviting me to join you on the journey in that direction! Peace be with you.

My role as Moderator is both complicated and simple. I believe in precision, attention to detail, being a transparent team leader and cheerleader, encouraging effective and empathetic communication and participation

of all members of our team. I intend to not micromanage but rely on the competency and dedication of excellent people. My agenda is that the LCC not only survive but THRIVE!



# **Historical Preservation Committee Annual Report for 2023**



This has been an exciting year for the Historical Preservation Committee as we prepare for our two hundred celebration in 2024.

The HPC has worked with church committees to provide a museum quality space in the Garden elevator entrance to the church to display each committee's good works over the history of our church. As well as offering a moment of history during services on Sunday and through the News Blast and Tower Tidings.

To kick this project off the Music and Worship Committee along with our Organist, Bob Bengtson provided us a

wonderful display of photos of the choir and posters of music concerts over the years. The display included operettas written by our former choir director, Beth Ide.

Also on display were Bells and chimes from the organ.

The Historical Preservation Committees offering showed photos our first meeting house which was in the Jewett house on Gilford Ave. The display included photos from our churches over the years including moving the church from the corner of Church Street and Main Street to across from the train station as well as the building of our current stone church.

Some of these photos found their way into the Property and Finance display. Photos and architect plans were displayed. A favorite photo was of building the tower and window.

Outreach offered a display in the Narthex of the many ways we reached out to support our community. # **Caring Connections Annual Report 2023**

As part of the celebration of our 200<sup>th</sup> Anniversary, Diane Wells created a notebook telling how Caring Connections came into being. It seems fitting to share her opening letter.

# THE STORY OF HOW CARING CONNECTIONS GOT STARTED

The story of visitation in the last 25 years is an interesting one. It has always been a commitment to be fulfilled by Deacons, the board that is to support the spiritual growth of the church members of Laconia Congregational Church. I know that Ellis Howard and Cindy Shippee led a visitation team, but it was a very small group.

When I became a deacon there was a time when a church member visited a shut-in and was asked if they came because they wanted to or had to! She was not a deacon, but loved visiting. So, a discussion began on how we could improve our care for lonely and/or sick members once they were at home. Our ministers would do hospital visits, what came next? At that time there had been a UCC interest in starting Health Ministries in churches. So, a group who had nursing experience or visiting training decided to meet and

discuss these needs. Rev. Grevatt was retiring and did wonderful visiting, so this need was felt. Ruth Stewart opened her home and we met with the guidance of Alida Millham and others who made a plan.

So, in 2007 the new Caring Connection was formed. At our meeting, through the Diaconate and minister, it was decided to ask people who were interested in being on a team who enjoyed visiting. We would hold training and set up teams so intentional caring occurred. Charlotte Leavitt and Alida Millham helped us get started. CARING CONNECTION BECAME A REALITY!

Enjoy this history to see how the group got started. It was always under the direction of a deacon with the help of team leaders. Following in the binder are the lists of who were the visitors and who they visited. Guidelines were established and the captains of each team met often to keep in touch with their team members. Changes were made as group living became more prevalent, but our purpose was to be sure that all church members knew they were cared for and that their church was strong in Spiritual love for all.

Margie Kreitler is coordinating rides to church. *This is newly added this year and we thank you Margie!* We can't always promise a ride, but we'll do our best. Mary Ellen Azem takes care of roses on the altar honoring 90<sup>th</sup>, 95<sup>th</sup>, and 100 + birthdays. *How wonderful to have three roses placed last year for John Gauthier, who celebrated his 103<sup>th</sup> birthday!* Diane Wells and Louise Bastille oversee our visitation needs, matching those who wish to be visited with visitors. Our visitors are the heart of Caring Connections, bringing church to those who cannot get to Sunday services.

#### **Educational Ministries Committee**

Horton Center continues to offer church members and friends an opportunity to explore their faith, build relationships, and enjoy the outdoors on beautiful Pine Mountain. We had children, youth and adults participating in a variety of week-long camps over the summer. Everyone came back with stories to tell and photos to share. Church members support children and families through the Horton Center Challenge established in 2022. This year, in addition to the Challenge, the EMC committee sponsored the Church Christmas card and every donation went directly to the Campership Fund. The Fund ensures that every child who attends camp is granted a full scholarship. As so many in our congregation can testify, a summer camp experience can be life changing. *Faith Formation* continues to meet on the second Sunday of the month. We have a multi-age group that gathers on one day rather than limited participation scattered on occasional Sundays. Other EMC activities included the design and oversight of the *Prayground* in the Chapel section of the sanctuary. The Prayground is intended to keep young children busy as their families attend the worship service. The area includes toys, books, and craft activities for "nursery aged" children and their families.

This year the *Lunch and Learn* series continued with a schedule of monthly noontime programs. The format followed a casual bring-your-own-lunch and learn about community programs, activities and events that are interesting and educational. In 2023 programs included: a tour of the church organ with Bob Bengtson; NH Alliance for Braver Angels with Muff Kruse; Concord Hospital Laconia's mental health services with Corey Gately; Prescott Farm's environmental education programming; the Inca Trail to Machu Picchu; an overview of Citizen's Climate Lobby; Rock, Steady, Boxing – a Parkinson's exercise program and many more. If you have an idea for a program, please reach out to an EMC committee member. More to come in 2024!

A very popular on-going activity includes the *Sunday afternoon walks* which continued with walks around Franklin Falls Dam, the Chamberlain-Reynolds Forest in Center Harbor, Canterbury Shaker Village and Prescott Farm in Laconia, NH. The walks attract many enthusiastic walkers especially in the winter, spring and fall months.

Members of our committee and other church friends participated in creating the *Vacation Bible School* that we offered this summer. The adult enthusiasm was amazing! We invited children entering grades 1-6 from any of the Merrimack Association Churches to participate in a free, 3-day VBS adventure. There was a lot of singing and game playing, projects, and Bible stories from Rev. Lovett. Three youth from our congregation, Ellen, Haily, and Lyllah, were very helpful as volunteers and had fun as well. A special thanks to Lorraine Barrows for being the resident musician and sharing her enthusiasm and energy!

In a model similar to our VBS program, we invited area UCC youth to participate in our 2023-2024 *Laconia Confirmation Experience*. This new approach has been meaningful for the six youth participants, and it provides fellowship for those who are the only Confirmand in their church. Diane Tinkham is serving as the facilitator, and we appreciate the variety of visiting ministers/specialists at each group meeting. We've been enjoying engaging discussions, providing opportunities to learn, and going to other Houses of Worship, and having fun together! The youth have chosen Mentors from their own congregations, and we hope that it will encourage the connection to their home churches. There are suggested activities for the Confirmands/Mentors to do in between the monthly group meetings. We hope that this flexibility meets the needs/schedules of today's youth as we work to offer them a meaningful Confirmation experience.

Thanks to our wonderful committee members who volunteered countless hours to make the above-noted activities and events happen! We are grateful for all of the ideas, laughter, commitment, and energy when we come together.

Thank you to Dave Shaw and John Intorcio for joining us this year and sharing your talents and insights as we worked to serve and care for our property, facilities and congregation. Special thanks to Bob Hunt for preparing our minutes, Hollis Thompson, Treasurer, for her financial guidance, our Interim Pastor Campbell Lovett for his support and encouragement and to Chuck Laurent for his constant care of our facilities and grounds. I especially want to thank the congregation for its continued support through your pledges, skills, talents and suggestions.

#### **Church and Office Security:**

We upgraded to a wired camera system that included 6 cameras, enabling us to have a greater ability to monitor access to the Church and the Parish House. Thank you to Granville for putting in a great deal of effort to get the wiring in. Thank you to Rich Morgan for helping the committee to make the best choice for our security. Lighting around the buildings/grounds was improved. The light at the Pleasant Street entrance was refurbished and the wattage increased. Narcan was put in place & staff were trained on how to use it appropriately if necessary.

#### **Grounds:**

The bushes to the left of the Pleasant Street stairs were removed and replaced with similar landscaping that is on the right side. Thank you to Granville Barrows and Dave Shaw for their hard work in removing the bushes. A leaking backflow valve in the automatic sprinkler system was repaired and passed inspection. We renewed our contract for snow removal.

#### **Office/Building Maintenance & Improvement:**

Thanks to a very generous donation, a new commercial freezer was purchased to replace our aging/failing freezer. The refrigerator needed a freon refill and the grease trap was cleaned out. Two electrical outlets were added in the Peace Garden entryway to enable our church to better meet the needs for events such as Pumpkin Fest & Hazel Duke Thanksgiving dinner. Our annual inspections were completed. A bench was removed to provide better wheelchair/walker access in the sanctuary.

#### **Continued Technology Improvements:**

Two speakers and 1 amp that had failed were replaced. A new computer was purchased to enhance our livestreaming capabilities. The Financial Secretary's computer was replaced.

We look forward to the coming year as we welcome new members to the committee, a new Pastor, and our celebration of 200 years!

# **Parish Activities Committee Annual Report for 2023**

We have also had to service the refrigerator in the kitchen a couple of times, but this most recent time, I think they were able to make it better.

Along comes the Hazel Duke dinner and the bottom oven decided it would not heat enough to cook turkeys are anything else. They made it through and served almost 200 dinners through take-out. This year the church held an auction in the church hall, a rummage sale in the Fall and a Christmas Fair in November. They were successful.

One of the toughest tasks is to keep clutter from the pantry floor. The boxes for storage are well used, and the table covers have been washed and are now hanging in the hall. This provides us with a little more storage room and keeps the covers from wrinkling.

A few of us have briefly discussed painting the church hall to make it look fresher and brighter. Maybe that would be a great project for 2024.

There is still a dry ease board on the refrigerator in the kitchen for listing items needed when they are getting low and a cabinet to check for backup supplies like cleaning supplies, paper towels, gloves, dish soap, sandwich bags and others of various sizes.

# Worship & Music Committee 2023

The entirety of our worship experience in 2023 has been enlivened and led by the interim ministry of the Rev. Campbell Lovett. His creativity and humor have kept us on our toes and opened us to the moving of the Spirit. We are grateful for the time he and Eileen have spent *with us on the journey* to a new settled ministry and wish them Godspeed as they move forward from here.

In January, the committee was the first to put up a historical display in the elevator foyer in preparation for the 200th anniversary of the church. We hope we set the bar high for other groups featured in succeeding months.

The Covid status of Belknap County was still "red" in January, and masking was still highly recommended. Luckily, this quickly and precipitously declined making communal worship more comfortable for many. We must all continue our vigilance regarding Covid, however, to protect each other from illness to the extent that we can.

Susan Smith joined our committee. She will bring a new perspective to us to which we very much look forward. No new Bell Choir Director has been found since Chandra Hazelton's resignation. It is our sincere hope that our bells will one day ring again when the time is right!

Our awareness was raised about our safety and security during worship through guided conversations (and coffee!) in February/March. Recommendations taken to and subsequently approved by Council were:

- A middle-ground approach should be followed.
- Staff, committees, and members are encouraged to speak to Council or Property & Finance regarding any concerns; and
- The impact of any projects on *welcome* should be assessed and *welcome* deliberately augmented if negatively affected.

In June, Rich Morgan installed new amplifiers and speakers. Mike Marshal is compiling a media tech manual and is maintaining a station for microphones at the media desk. He has also purchased chargers and rechargeable batteries to keep microphones fully charged.

In October, John Intorcio, with limited training, attempted to livestream our Sunday service in the absence of Mike. By Christmas Eve, he was a master of the medium! Thanks to ALL our "techies" for making our services accessible far beyond our sanctuary!

Since November, we are once again passing the plates for the collection of the morning offering. It has proven to be an effective way to ensure that contributions stay timely which assures the missions and ministries of the church have what they need.

Campbell mixed it up in style and format for sermons during the year. While not an exhaustive list, you may well remember the lenten series Lookin' for Love in All the Wrong Places with a music video of *Leaning In: A Prayer of Intention*; the sermon introduction written by Artificial Intelligence in various voices including that of Thomas the Tank Engine; Broadway Sunday featuring the Power Chords; the All-Saints Day service of candle lighting and naming those who we lost this year; and a modern Pageant Prequel—unmuted! Engagement was high and, we hope, all took blessings and personal challenges for the living of our days from these experiences.

Musically, our choir sang many familiar favorites as well as a good number of never-before-sung anthems to enhance our worship experiences. The 20 faithful singers must be sincerely thanked for their ministry of music. Bob Bengtson fully enjoyed the close collaboration he shared with Campbell in planning for music that supported the mood and themes of each service throughout the year.

Beyond that, we hosted several extraordinary musical events that were very well-received. In September, Church Hall was transformed to a jazz supper club for a Jazz Pot Luck featuring Emilia Halstead and her Jazz Ensemble from First Church, Concord. In October, Henry Wong Doe, a talented pianist with Gilford ties who has been using our Steinway grand piano while visiting the area for a number of years, played a varied and magnificent piano recital which was followed by an appetizer reception. In December, in thanks for the use of the church for rehearsals, Lorraine Barrows directed her Power Chords in a Broadway and holiday hits concert which was followed by cookies and punch.

We give thanks for all of you who have participated in the worship and music ministries of our church. May we all take to heart the entreaty to: *Love God, Love Neighbor, Include Everyone*.
